	Maps are exciting and intriguing and add a layer of	
	reality. If I see a map on writer's blog, I get intrigued	
	 and check out author's book Most readers love them

	•	Not Adobe Photoshop, but okay	
	•	Layers will simplify things	
	•	Start with continents.	
	•	This looks like big task – just draw a shape	
	•	Then, refine coast – make it jagged/serrated. Add islands and inlets.	
	•	Later, erase it or close layer	
	•	Put other things like Deepening bays, create inlets and other features	
	•	Lakes and other bodies of water	
	•	If try and do this at beginning, looks daunting	
	•	Do as many layers as you wish until refine it enough	
	•	Look at other features like mountains	
	•	Use a faint pencil line – shows how range will extend	
	•	Then draw mountain-like shapes along the line	
	•	Then have mountains extending along other mountains	
	•	Then, erase faint line	
	•	Put in shading and other elements to make it more	
		three dimensional	
	•	Want something geologically possible.	
	•	Mountains – advantage – rivers flow from them	
	•	Put rivers in after mountains in place – have them go to the inlets	
	•	General line of river in place, give it a more serpentine shape and more detail – then add deltas and tributaries	
	•	Once have basic things in place, easier to place cities	
	•	Cities need water – put them close to a source of water	
	•	If civilization is advanced – there may be other ways of getting water	
	•	General rule for rivers – flat – meanders / steep – straight	
	•	Lakes – do mountains first, and then when have valleys, can have lakes collect there	
	•	Start with elements that are important to the story.	
	•	In fantasy, setting is a character. Characters will	
		react to the setting	
	•	Cities are placed depending on population – sparse	
		or very populated. Where is food coming from (flat	
		ground needed for farming)	
	•	Book also talks about making things pretty and	
		symbology for cities or hamlets or villages	
	•	Roads – highways can be thick lines, and small roads can be dotted lines	
	•	City symbols
